TRI COUNTY MERCANTILE

The Tri-County Mercantile is a new business in Chugwater, but with roots going back to the late 1940s.

Construction of the Tri-County Grain Co. elevator started in 1948 and was finished by late 1949 just four years after World War II had ended. The original business sold farm implements, ranch supplies, livestock feed, and was an International Harvester dealer, in addition to the grain storage business.

The Tri-County Mercantile today takes over that legacy by selling farm and ranch supply as well as livestock feed in the very same building from 75 years ago. Keeping the Tri-County name was important to continuing the core of what that original business was, and the name locals had come to know over those years.

The Mercantile title, however, comes from the old Swan Mercantile (located about 200 yards behind it) to let people know the business model had expanded into groceries and dry goods while maintaining a traditional feel. Looking towards the future, the Tri-County is always finding ways to expand its selection based on what locals need to make their life more convenient and easier, and offering quality products at fair prices. Today you can find a standard range of groceries and propane refills are available on site, along with livestock and pet feeds, a wide selection of Arbuckles Coffee, souvenirs and gifts, and many other small household necessities.

The Tri-County Mercantile is operated by partnership Chugwater Downtown Group LLC made up of lifetime Chugwater area ranchers Jesse and Arden Miller and Pennsylvania newcomer turned Chugwater resident Joshua Hopkins.


Summer Reading programs are starting soon. Please come by the Library to get more details. Wheatland Branch will be hosting several events throughout the summer.
